

POLICE IN AFGHANISTAN

Over the 11-year conflict about 300 Canadian police from across the country volunteered to train the Afghan National Police (ANP). In 2010 about 50 RCMP and other civilian Canadian police were posted to Afghanistan with more arriving in the post-2014 gradual shift in ISAF's mission from combat to support.

Challenges of trying to bring about the rule of law were many. The corrupt ANP was distrusted and ineffectual which challenged the adoption of community policing. Many recruits were illiterate making pamphlets useless and translators necessary. Family and tribal

loyalties required a sensitivity to culture and customs.

Canadian police were not there to enforce Afghan law, but to mentor Afghans enforcing their laws.



Hamilton Police Service in the Afghanistan Mission




Together. Stronger. Safer.
